Sentence 1 (Attention Getter): catch the reader's attention with a relevant quote, question, anecdote, fascinating fact, analogy, the position opposing one you will take, or a dilemma that needs a solution Sentence 2 (Bridge Sentence): build a bridge from the conclusion to the thesis by providing context, relevant information the reader will need to know to understand the essay Sentence 3 (Thesis): a specific and accurate sentence that explains the subject of your paper and the ideas on which you will focus	1 INTRODUCTION 3 4
Sentence 1 (Topic Sentence): • should be a personal example • should identify the main idea and point of the paragraph • should NOT be too general or too specific Following Sentences (Support): • include specific evidence that supports your thesis • provide vivid, concrete, and relevant details Last Sentence (Analysis): explain to the reader the significance of the evidence you have provided.
